



musicfirst Introduction to Popular Music Course Syllabus for Teachers

In this course, students will explore many styles of American Popular Music. Lessons include a wide variety of listening, responding, performing, and creating activities. Throughout the course, students are encouraged to connect the historical, cultural, and technological contexts of the times, and with current musical artists.

Each unit focuses on a different genre, musical style, or decade and is aligned with the National Core Arts Standards of Creating, Presenting/Performing/Producing, Responding, and Connecting.

This course is intended for use in-class with students, flipped-classroom activities, or as substitute plans.

Units and lessons can be used in your choice of sequence or as standalone activities. As with all MusicFirst Library content, lessons can be adapted to meet the needs of your students and class schedule.

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Activity types include:

- Remixes, Mash-Ups, Sampling, and Composing projects using your choice of DAW, such as Soundtrap or OGenPlus
- Karaoke singing and performing song covers
- Presentations and Podcasts about artists, bands, musical styles, and related events
- Music listening and discussion tasks including Critiques, Music Reviews, and Song Comparisons
- Fan Quizzes, Album Cover, and Storyboarding projects where students can share independent learning and links to prior knowledge in creative ways
